

MYTHOLOGY FINAL PROJECT

Myth comes from the Greek word "mythos", which means "to tell a story". Throughout January, February and the first half of March, students in Grade 3 will be learning about Greek & Roman myths, as well as myths from countries around the world.

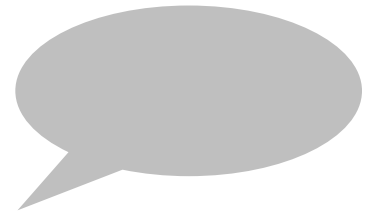
The final project for this unit will be done **at home**. It will be due on **Friday March 9 2018**.

Students are to create a short (minimum of 8 panels of whichever size - both small and large panels will be graded the same) graphic novel/comic book based on a myth of their choosing. This graphic novel can be created on the computer or by hand and should be done as independently as possible.

The end product should look polished and neat. A title page with the name of the myth and the author's name should be included. Rulers and neat printing are to be used for hand-drawn projects, and skills learned in computers class should be used for digital projects. *Note that this project will count toward LANGUAGE and VISUAL ART final grades.*

In order to achieve full marks, students should:

- have at least 2 different and distinct characters.
- use comic-style speech and thinking bubbles.
- use a variety of colours to make the pictures POP! (note: if the project is hand drawn, colouring should be done neatly and in pencil crayon).
- use proper spelling and grammar.
