Community Based Adult Literacy

186 adults participated in JCLC's community programs

- 131 English language learners received instruction
- 15 Native English speakers received tutoring in basic skills / GED prep
- 40 participated in basic computer skills classes
- 6 enrolled in U.S. Citizenship Class
- 2 individuals earned U. S. Citizenship
- 50 volunteer tutors provided more than 3,200 instructional hours



Adult Literacy and Criminal Justice

156 incarcerated adults received services at Jefferson County Jail

- 138 studied Adult Basic Education and GED preparation (including career orientation)
 - 18 attended job skills workshop on interviewing skills
 - 1 inmate completed GED test and successfully completed GED or HSED
 - 36 children received DVDs of their incarcerated parent/guardian reading to them in Storybook Project
 - 2 part time instructors provided a total of 1,010 hours of instruction with participants accumulating over 6,320 attendance hours of learning
- ✓ JCLC continued leadership and expansion with Reducing Recidivism Coalition (RRC)
 - ✓ JCLC served on the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC)

Early and Family Literacy

Two book drives collected over 1,100 children's books

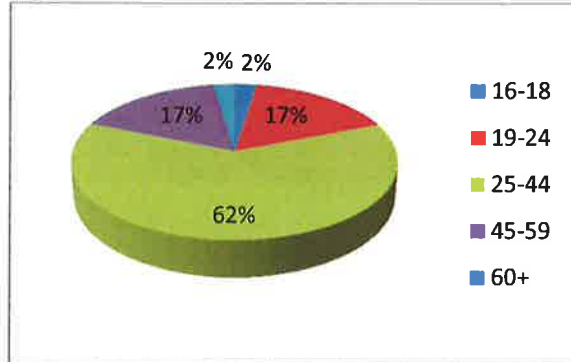
- We Energies of Fort Atkinson employees donated 600 books

77 served through Health Literacy Initiatives

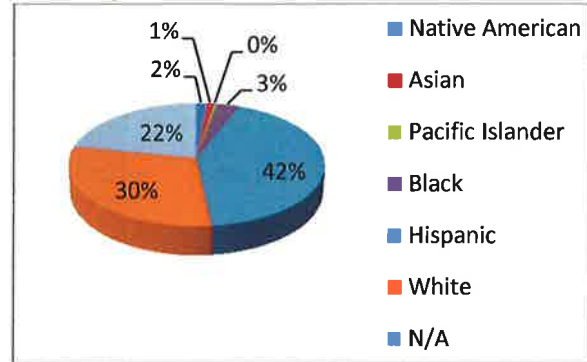
- One medication labeling workshop held with simultaneous translation services

JCLC Learner Demographics

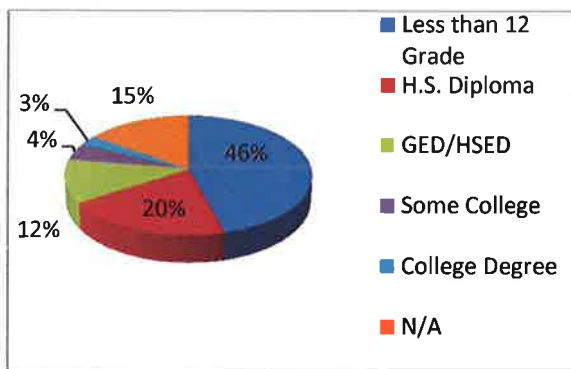
Age



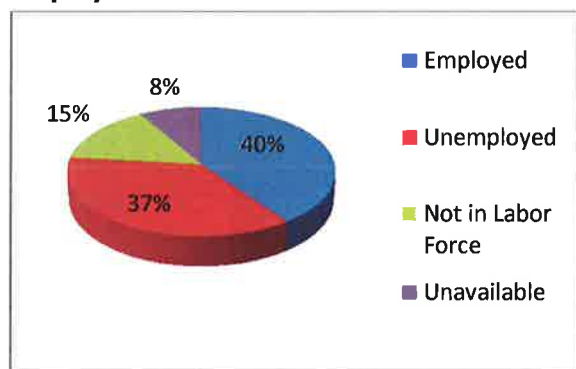
Ethnicity



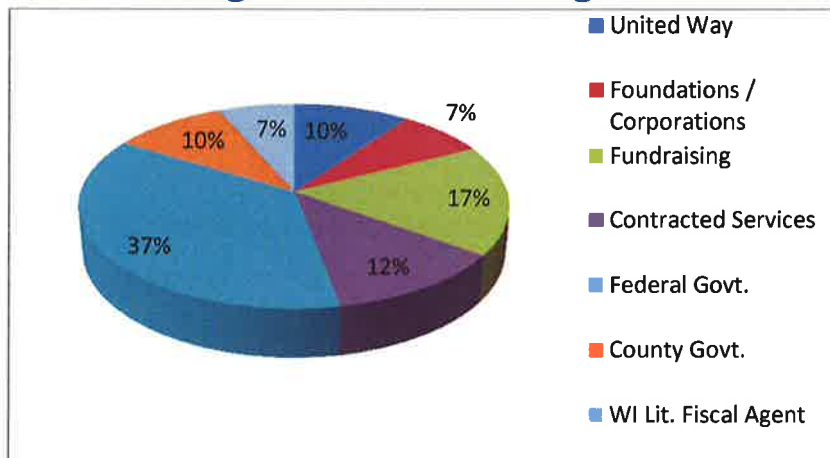
Level of Education

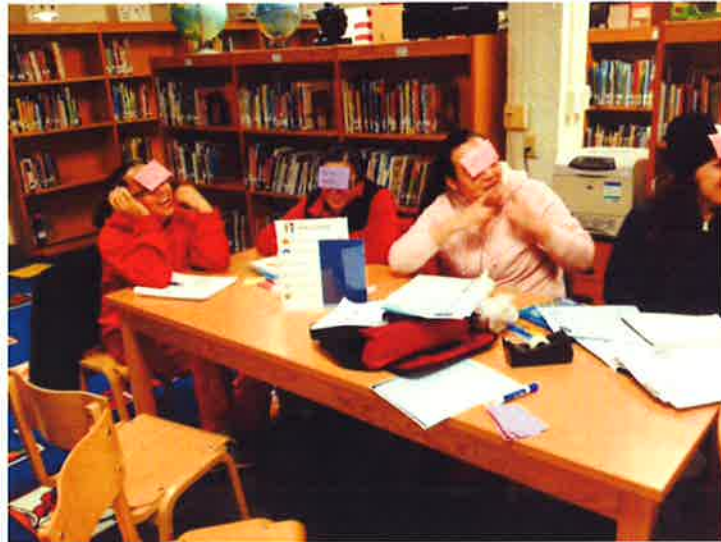


Employed Status

Annual Update to the Jefferson County Board February 9, 2016

What Does JCLC Do?

- Provides free basic literacy skills instruction to adults utilizing trained volunteers and paid instructors
- Collaborates with private and public providers, businesses and organizations across Jefferson County to foster a community assets approach to serving cross categorical needs of individuals and families
- Attempts to reduce crime and recidivism through correctional education
- Addresses labor shortages of area businesses through workforce development
- Increases opportunities for self-sufficiency and financial independence of participants
- Provides family-based events that foster an awareness of the importance of parents' roles in their children's literacy development and educational process
- Raises awareness about literacy issues and advocates for change
- Provides meaningful volunteer opportunities for adults

Accomplishments in 2015

Agency and client outcomes for the JCLC are aligned with the expectations of the Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) of 2014. The agency is charged with improving five core learner outcomes identified by the National Reporting System (NRS): 1. Educational Gain, 2. Enter Employment, 3. Retain Employment, 4. Obtain Secondary Credential, and 5. Enter Postsecondary Education or Training. JCLC's performance on these measures is identified in the FY 14/15 Annual Report.

- Administered first online GED test in the jail; learner passed with honors and earned an HSED
- Added new ESL classes: Waterloo Public Library, Schurz Elementary School in Watertown, U. S. Citizenship at Johnson Creek High School and an evening class at Rock Lake Activity Center in Lake Mills
- We Energies employees conducted a children's book drive and 600 books were distributed at Ready Kids for School event
- 25 new volunteer tutors trained
- Provided internships to one student from Ripon College and an AmeriCorps student from UW-Whitewater; five students from Maranatha University, Madison College and UW-Whitewater were trained as student volunteer tutors
- Conducted three health literacy focus groups on health insurance, health information software, and reading medication labels
- Met with 50 Head Start parents to distribute health and dental resource books in Spanish and English

- Applied for two new grants: 1. DPI 21st Century Community Learning Center grant with Watertown Unified School District and the YMCA of Watertown and 2. United States Citizenship & Immigration Services grant with Catholic Multicultural Center
- Hired a new Program Coordinator
- Improved financial status of the organization through increased fundraising efforts

Goals for 2016

A solid foundation in reading is required to help students learn from complex texts that are used in postsecondary education, job training, and lifelong learning. In 2016, JCLC seeks to place more emphasis on reading instruction for all learners, but especially those individuals who are at the highest levels according to the National Reporting System (NRS) and have a goal of earning a high school diploma and/or entering post-secondary career pathway programs or job training.

- Place increased emphasis on identifying individual client goals and transitioning learners to Madison College for high school completion and/or career pathway training programs
- Train all JCLC staff and instructors in Student Achievement in Reading (STAR) methodology to increase their effectiveness in teaching the essential components of reading to adults: ~~alphabetic~~, fluency, vocabulary and reading comprehension
- Use more contextualized curriculum materials designed for workplace literacy
- Enhance instruction in computer literacy and internet search skills
- Increase the use of technology to accelerate learning
- Implement a lending library at the Jefferson County Jail to increase reading comprehension skills
- Develop and deliver a financial literacy program at the jail
- Introduce a new procedure for administering online GED testing at the jail
- More closely align the activities of the Reducing Recidivism Coalition with the mission of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council
- Partner with the Jefferson County health nurses to implement an early literacy program based on the Scholastic Reach Out and Read program
- Increase collaboration with other county agencies and non-profit organizations
