#### Communication Facts

Is there a difference between "Speech" and "Language"?

Yes! 'Speech' is generally the dominate characteristic in people's mind when they think of speech/language therapy; however, both are equally important when communicating.

**Speech:** the physical production of sounds and sound combinations to make words. Influences how clearly an individual sounds to a listener.

Language: the content of what is being said. Often distinguished by understanding, expression (sentences /grammar) and pragmatics or social language.

## Speech & Language at Home

*Visuals* can be extremely powerful tools for children with difficulties expressing themselves.

- Write out directions an auditory direction is fleeting.
  Write down what you want your child to do and keep it in a visible spot for reminders.
- Visual rewards a token board is a visual reward system. Your child can work for 5 stars by completing specific tasks to earn his/her desired reward.
- Take pictures if routines are difficult, use photographs posted in sequential order to remind them what comes next.
