Nouns are a person, place thing or idea.

Person- boy, bride, teacher Thing- bicycle, dog, flower

Place-street, school park Idea- joy, hope, sadness

A common noun names any person, place, thing or idea.

Man, country, book

A proper noun names a specific person, place, thing or idea.

Mr. Taylor, Mexico, Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows

Pronouns are words that take the place of a noun.

Singular Pronouns Plural Pronouns

1st Person I, Me, My, Mine We, our, us, ours

2nd Person you, your, yours you, your, yours

3rd Person he, him, his they, their, them, theirs

hers, she, her

it, its

Adjectives describe the noun and usually come before the noun they are describing

The little seed The pretty flowers The fast swimmer

Adverbs describe the verb or how an action is being done. Usually they tell you when, where, or how.

When Where How

Always, never, soon outside, there, up slowly, loudly, jokingly Words that end in -ly are always adverbs.

A preposition tells when or where an object in the sentence will be used, introduces the Prepositional Phrase.

Common Prepositions: to, in, under, across, after, with, against, near

The mouse ran \_\_\_\_\_ the house.

Any word that makes sense in the blank is a preposition.

Conjunctions connect words or groups of words. Common conjunctions are and, but, and or.

Charley and Barbara run fast.

I went to the mall, the store, and the beach.

Interjection is a word or a phrase that express strong emotion.

Ah! It's scary.

Hey! I did it.
