

By picking up this book you've entered the world of Amazing Words. And you're on your way to building your own Amazing Word Power.



Word Power Tips

Are you ready to add 100 words to your vocabulary? Check out the 10 tips below. They're a great way to help boost your Amazing Word Power!

- 1. Keep Track of Your Progress. Use the Checklist that starts on page 125 with the back cover flap to keep track of your growing vocabulary. Cover the definitions with the flap and quiz yourself. (Be sure to use a dry-erase marker.) Test yourself every few weeks to see how many new words you have learned.
- 2. Say the Word Aloud. A pronunciation is given for every word, and you'll also find a pronunciation guide on the inside of the back cover flap. Saying the word will help you remember it better. And the more you say it, the better chance you have of remembering it!
